| 1812 (age 54) Publishes an historical novel, <i>The Loyalists</i> | 1811-13 (age 35-37) Writing Mansfield Park, revising Pride and Prejudice |
| | Jan. 1813 (age 37) Pride and Prejudice published anonymously as "By the Author of Sense and Sensibility" |
| | Oct. 1813 (age 37) Second editions of <i>Pride and Prejudice</i> and <i>Sense and Sensibility</i> published |
| 1814 (age 56) Publishes an historical romance, <i>Alicia de Lacy</i> | May 1814 (age 38) Mansfield Park published anonymously ("by the author of") |
| | Sept. 28, 1814 (age 38) Writes letter to niece Anna Lefroy: "I am quite determined however not to be pleased with Ms West's Alicia de Lacy, should I ever meet with it, which I hope I may not. — I think I can be stout against any thing written by Mrs West.— I have made up my mind to like novels really, but Miss Edgeworth's, Yours & my own." |

| | 1815-16 (age 39-40) Writing <i>The Elliots</i> (which becomes <i>Persuasion</i>) |
| 1815 (age 57) Publishes anonymously Vicissitudes of Life; Exemplified in the Interesting Memoirs of a Young Lady, in a Series of Letters | Dec. 1815 (age 40) Emma published anonymously ("by the author of"), dedicated to the Prince Regent |

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| | 1816 (age 40) Second edition of <i>Mansfield Park</i> published |
| | Sept. 1816 (age 40) Writes letter to Cassandra: "I often wonder how you can find time for what you do, in addition to the care of the house; and how good Mrs. West could have written such books and collected so many hard works, with all her family cares, is still more a matter of astonishment!" |
| 1817 (age 59) Publishes <i>Scriptural Essays Adapted to the Holy</i> Days of the Church of England | JanMarch 1817 (age 41) Works on <i>The Brothers</i> (which becomes <i>Sanditon</i>) July 18, 1817 (age 41) |
| | Dies in Winchester Dec. 1817 Northanger Abbey and Persuasion published together, posthumously, with a biographical note by her brother Henry naming Austen for the first time as the author of these novels |
| 1823 (age 65) Husband Thomas West dies | |
| 1827 (age 69) Publishes her final novel, Ringrove, or, Old Fashioned Notions | |
| | 1833 Richard Bentley publishes Austen's collected works; her work will never go out of print again. |
| 1843 (age 85) Eldest son dies | |
| 1852 (age 94) Dies in her home in Little Bowden, outliving all three sons, leaving 6 grandchildren | |
